# Son and Mephew of Byron Miller '90 Are Heroes

### Boys Use Cub Scout Lessons to Save Friend Who Fell Through Ice

A snow day meant no school for youngsters on Tuesday, December 14, 2010, but the free day almost turned deadly for one Macomb Township boy. Gianmarco Delisi, 10, was snowboarding with friends at the Rivers subdivision near 25 Mile and Romeo Plank when he hit a bump and fell through the ice into a retention pond. After a few minutes of chaos, he was safely pulled from the frigid water by his pals Kamden Miller, 9, and Kamden's cousin, 11-year-old Anthony Tocco, who had formed a human chain to rescue him. *Kamden Miller is the son of Byron Miller '90* and *Anthony Tocco is Byron's nephew*.

"The next thing I could see was blackness when I was in the water," said Gianmarco, a fifth grader at Duncan Elementary School," I was reaching for anything to hold onto. I could hear my friends yelling 'What should we do?' I heard a lot of yelling," Gianmarco added.

As it turns out, his friends reacted quickly. Kamden Miller called on his Cub Scout training where he learned how to try to help someone who has fallen into open water when the body of water is covered with ice. Kamden crawled on the ice on his stomach to reach out to his flailing friend. "He almost pulled me in the water because I was kind of spinning on the ice while trying to reach him," Kamden said. "I grabbed onto a log that was frozen on the water and used that. Then my cousin came and pulled me while Gianmarco grabbed my foot and we got him out," Miller said.

Gianmarco had been in the water for about two minutes but came out unhurt, according to his parents, Ana Maria and Paul Delisi.

Homeowners say the water in the retention pond is about 20 feet deep. The area around the pond is a common recreation area for people in the Rivers subdivision. Kamden's parents, **Byron '90 and Nikole Miller**, feel a snow fence or some other form of barrier should be erected around the water to prevent future incidents.

Kamden Miller's method of rescuing his buddy was the correct one, according to ice safety experts. Andy Houde, a battalion chief for the Harrison Township Fire Department — which regularly conducts water safety drills on Lake St. Clair — said ideally, a rescuer should use a rope or branch to reach out to someone who has fallen through the ice to avoid being pulled in. "It sounds like in this case, the boy crawled out on his stomach, and that's good because he was dispersing his weight across the ice," Houde said. "If you're in the water, the idea is to try to lift yourself out onto your belly and roll out of the water," Houde added. Hypothermia sets in after just a few moments of being in the water, Houde added, which can impact a person's coordination and motor skills.

Gianmarco's parents praised the efforts of Kamden Miller. "Yes definitely, he is a hero," Anna Marie Delisi said. Nikole Miller added: "I am proud of all of them. Gianmarco did good, too."

# Turkey Trot Runner Dies After Operation

### Greg Schultz '76 Collapsed During Annual Race

A man who collapsed while running in Detroit's Turkey Trot races on Thanksgiving Day died two days after undergoing triple bypass heart surgery, Race Director Doug Kurtis said. *Gregory Alan Schultz '76*, of Eastpointe was running in the 10-K (6.2-mile) race on Nov. 25 when he fell to the pavement near the five-mile marker on Michigan Avenue at Brooklyn. He was revived at the scene and seemed to be recovering, first at Detroit Receiving Hospital and then at Harper Hospital in Detroit, Kurtis said.

"He was in good spirits when I talked to him on Sunday," said Kurtis, who oversaw the event with a record of about 17,000 participants in three races. It was the first fatality connected with the event in its 28 years, Kurtis said. "I am just bummed to hear of Mr. Schultz' death," registered nurse Jan Treston Aurand of Howell said. Aurand was one of four medically trained runners, including an emergency medicine physician, who stopped to revive Schultz before an ambulance arrived, she said Thursday.

"The color he turned was so scary. All I could feel was a weak pulse," Aurand said Wednesday. She said that, before learning of his death, she had enjoyed "the glory of finishing the race myself and knowing that he will run again." Mr. Schultz was a veteran runner who had run the Turkey Trot almost every year for nearly a decade, his wife Julia Schultz, 50, said Wednesday night. He also had run three Free Press marathons and countless other races, she said. "He loved, at the races, to always thank the police officers and volunteers as he'd run around a corner," she said.

Just before his death, her husband was almost his usual self, she said. "He had a ball in the hospital," joking with staff and visitors, Julia Shultz said. "But two days after his bypass operation, basically, his heart just gave out. With any surgery, there's always risk involved," she said. The two, married almost 30 years, met at a Notre Dame High School dance.

Mr. Schultz, a lifelong resident of Eastpointe, graduated in 1980 from Wayne State University School of Mortuary Science and ran the S.K. Schultz Funeral Home business founded by his father in what then was East Detroit. Gregory Schultz expanded the business by opening a second location in Clinton Township. Still, the family, including daughter Breanna, 15, always made their home across the street from the original funeral home on Gratiot, she said. Besides enjoying the sport of running, Mr. Schultz liked cycling, photography and relaxing with books, his family said. He was an active member of the Professional Car Society, a nationwide club of people who collect vintage hearses. "His blue 1950 Henney Landau (hearse) was a personal favorite of mine," Flint funeral director Brady Smith, a past president of the club, said in an on-line forum of members who mourned Mr. Schultz' death on-line.

### Mayor Says Death of Greg Schultz '76 'True Loss to Community'

The Eastpointe community is mourning the death of mortician *Greg Schultz '76*, whose family operates one of Macomb County's oldest funeral homes. Schultz, head of S.K. Schultz Funeral Homes in Eastpointe and Clinton Township, died Wednesday from heart failure after taking part in the Turkey Trot, a 10k run in downtown Detroit on Thanksgiving Day, according to his family. He was 52. "He passed out at the run and was taken to Harper Hospital where they performed bypass surgery," said his wife, Julia Schultz. "He was recuperating for a few days but his heart just gave out," she added.

Greg Schultz operated the bereavement facility on Gratiot at Toepfer, which was started in 1954 by his father, Stanley Schultz. He later expanded the family business to a second location on Garfield Road near 19 Mile Road in Clinton Township in 2007.

Schultz's roots in the Eastpointe community ran deep. He was a graduate of St. Veronica Grade School in what was then known as East Detroit and Notre Dame High School, where he met his future wife at a school dance. As a teen, he worked for his father cutting the grass at the funeral home.

He followed his father's footsteps in the funeral industry and graduated in 1980 from the Wayne State School of Mortuary Science. He also earned a bachelor's degree in business at Walsh College.

His community involvement included working with his wife at the fish fry dinners at St. Veronica Catholic Church and sponsoring numerous activities. He also participated in the Cruisin' Gratiot event by allowing the public to view an antique 1950s-era Henney hearse.

"Schultz's death is a true loss to our community," Mayor Suzanne Pixley said. "He was a really great guy and an active man," Pixley said. "He was involved in a bicycle club. You'd see them park over at the funeral home and ride out to Grosse Pointe or to the west to Warren. He's going to be sorely missed," she concluded.

Employees at the funeral home say they are working to care for other families who have lost loved ones even as they continue to mourn the loss of their boss — which is what Schultz would have wanted. "It's going to be tough without him because he was the patriarch of this business," said Meaghan Gage, an apprentice at the funeral home. "He was a kind man, a good honest person who had a laugh that would light up the whole room. He taught us to try to be family oriented and try to help our families wherever we could."

# ND Pair Finds Joy in Junk

### After Struggling in Bad Job Market, They Join Family Franchise

Other people's trash turns into a real treasure for *Dan Ryan '02 and Patrick Lipa '03*, two friends who played hockey together at Notre Dame and now run the first Michigan franchise of College Hunks Hauling Junk. The co-owners of the Berkley franchise expect to reach \$200,000 in sales by the end of this year — a more than 50 percent increase over 2009 — with their youthful, clean-cut image. "We're part of the largest and fastest-growing U.S.-based junk removal franchise," said Ryan, 27. "We thrive in difficult times. If people are closing up shop, moving to smaller quarters, become overwhelmed by the stuff they accumulated, we can haul it out of there and donate goods to charity," he said.

Lipa and Ryan own two large box trucks imprinted with their 1-800-Junk-USA logo. They charge a minimum of \$98 to a maximum of \$529 for a full truck with 11 price levels in between. One vehicle is often parked on Woodward Avenue near its Berkley headquarters and another near highly trafficked intersections around town.

Hunk haulers wear starched green shirts with the company logo and khakis. At least one elderly lady tried to get fresh, Ryan said, thinking "hunk" was akin to a calendar pin-up boy. With polite firmness, the men are trained to decline improper advances and finish the job on schedule. One customer told the employees they were so efficient she wondered if they would take her ex-husband. They declined.

Becoming junk-hauling entrepreneurs wasn't the game plan for Lipa or Ryan, who followed each other to Wayne State University. Lipa majored in marketing, Ryan in communications. In these recessed times, they became part of a wave of under-employed college graduates with small hopes of landing, let alone keeping, high-paying corporate jobs. Ryan's cousin, Nick Friedman, was half of a celebrated duo that founded College Hunks Hauling Junk in 2003, transforming a prize-winning college proposal into a franchise that now has 33 locations, appearances on CNN and CBS, as well as \$4 million in annual sales.

"I was a bit surprised when Dan approached me out of the blue. I was flattered and hesitant," Friedman said. "I started a business with my best friend, and it became a strain on our friendship. We've worked it out. Yet I was concerned about mixing family with business. "On the other hand, it was a cool opportunity to work closely with my cousin and build something special."

Friedman wouldn't cut corners for family. He charged the standard \$35,000 franchise fee and insisted Ryan and Lipa raise \$100,000 for vehicles, permits, working capital, marketing and more. The firm supplied a 100-point checklist and sent the entrepreneurial pair through a weeklong training program at the corporate headquarters in Tampa.

With persistence, Ryan and Lipa obtained a small business loan, cash advances from family and opened their doors in May 2009. By the end of the first year, they reached \$130,000 in sales by removing furniture and bulk trash, cleaning up debris and recycling electronics.

More than 65 percent of everything picked up is donated to charity or recycled. A portion of their revenue goes to College Bound, a nonprofit scholarship program. "I found College Hunks Hauling Junk on the Internet. The owners were about the same age as my son, so I was happy to give them some business," said Sue Croll of Grosse Pointe Park, who wanted her son's discarded couch, dresser and memorabilia removed.

Ryan and Lipa face competition in the dogged junkyard trade that includes a surge of national companies like 1-888-Trash-It, www.AbleJunk.com and 1-800-GotJunk as well as the traditional local outlets with a pickup truck. College Hunks expect a surge in business around the holidays as people look to donate goods to charity for tax credits. "People refer others to us because we're courteous; we respect their possessions and ask before tossing anything," Ryan said. "We expect to become the Ritz-Carlton of junk hauling."

# Lorenzo 61 Tapped by Mackel

### Former Macomb CC President to Serve as Assistant County Executive

Al Lorenzo '61, the former president of Macomb Community College and current chairman of the council of policy advisers to Macomb County Executive-elect Mark Hackel will serve as an assistant county executive. The appointment will be on a temporary, part-time basis after a former appointee to the position abruptly resigned amid allegations from a lawsuit over an affair he had with a former aide. Lorenzo agreed to replace Damian Kassab, who resigned Monday. Lorenzo, 67, of Clinton Township said today that he did not know how long he would hold the position. The new county charter requires Hackel to submit an organization plan for the new county government within his first 180 days in office. He takes over as the county's first executive Jan. 1.

"One of our pressing responsibilities is to develop that organizational plan. I imagine I'll be there long enough to develop that plan," Lorenzo said. He said he has agreed to be paid half of whatever the salary will be for the position. The salary has not been established yet.

Kassab's resignation created "an incredible void in Mark's staffing plans," Lorenzo said, because Kassab would have been the only executive staff member on board when Hackel took over. Mark Deldin, superintendent of Chippewa Valley Schools, whom Hackel tapped as his deputy executive, said he would join the executive team Jan. 24.

Kassab filed a lawsuit Nov. 24 against former aide Kelly Dobek, 44, of Rochester claiming she had harassed him. She filed a counterclaim Dec. 16, alleging that she was the victim and that Kassab - a lawyer, former bank officer and former board member of the Michigan Gaming Control Board - had given her genital herpes and threatened to have her arrested and physically harmed.

In his lawsuit, Kassab admitted to an affair with Dobek that began in May or June 2009. He said she began demanding money and within a few weeks told him she had contracted herpes from him.

Lorenzo said he will continue to be an executive in residence at Oakland University, where he helps the university develop and expand programs to Macomb and St. Clair counties. He said the university also helps with economic development efforts in Macomb County.

Lorenzo said he also will continue to chair Hackel's council of policy advisers, which focuses on areas ranging from education to public health and economic development to local government issues. His focus on the council is strategic planning, economic and workforce development and post-secondary education.

Lorenzo said that he looks forward to working with Hackel but could not say today if he would serve as assistant county executive full-time if asked to do so.

"All of this is evolving," said Lorenzo, who is married with four grown children and eight grandchildren.

He said of why he took the position: "I've spent my entire life working in Macomb County. We live in Macomb County; our kids went to school in Macomb County. Everything I've done has been to try to advance the quality of life in Macomb County. It was a logical extension of that," he concluded.

# Kelly '90 to Relocate Gymnastics School

### Respected as Premier Gymnastics Coach in Michigan

Young gymnasts who aspire to go for the gold might thank Warren officials if that dream comes true. The owner of a gymnastics studio looking to move his business to Warren from Clinton Township got a perfect score from city officials this week. City Council members voted 8-0 to grant a special land use for Extreme Gymnastics to operate in an industrial building on 10 Mile Road at Groesbeck.

Owner *Tim Kelly '90*, considered one of the premier gymnastics coaches in Michigan, said he will relocate the training center after 10 years near 15 Mile and Harper roads in Clinton Township. "We run classes for boys and girls, ages 2 and up," Kelly said.

The studio will occupy a 10,680-square-foot building that is one of four owned by Osprey Construction & Development. Osprey representative Andrew Pflaum said the company renovated the office area of the building two years ago, with the intent of attracting a new tenant for the vacant building. With Extreme Gymnastics slated to move in, Pflaum said, "The building is going to improve substantially from what it was even just a couple years ago." City records show that the studio will be open from 9:30 a.m. – 2 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, and 8:30 a.m.- 1 p.m. on Saturday. Weekly classes will be held from 4-8:30 p.m., with five or six classes of approximately seven children per class running concurrently. Drop-in sessions also will be held.

Councilwoman Kathy Vogt said her daughter participated in gymnastics for years and welcomed the new business. "It's great for the kids," she said. "It's a great discipline as well as physical training."

The winners have been named in the Elmore Leonard Literary Arts and Film Festival. Submissions were required to reference a location within the state of Michigan (a specific city, landmark, building or locale). Remaining in line with the Elmore Leonard theme, all works were also required to be in the genre of mystery or crime.

In a made-for-the-movies beginning, two young writers who met working in the Sony Pictures mailroom, Tom Hass and *Danny Drop '00*, co-winners of the Elmore Leonard Film Festival screenplay competition, quickly discovered they were both from Michigan. They also discovered each had a passion for writing. Hass, originally from Kalamazoo, lives in Los Angeles. Drop is from St. Clair Shores.

Hass is a film and video editor at Dick Clark productions. His first feature, "Night Club," starring Ernest Borgnine, Zachary Abel, and Natasha Lyonne, is entered in several festivals.


